

Arrival: 11:30 am for a 12:00 pm start


Enjoy an afternoon with refreshments and finger food throughout the event.

The Swiss Yodlers of Sydney are currently on a break after a challenging but successful Swiss National Day Celebration at Castle Hill Showground, Castle Hill, on 3rd August. The biggest challenge was dealing with the deluge of rain leading up to the celebration.

As many of you

are aware, we normally have the event outside with the many tables and chairs located on the lawn between the Federation and Education pavilions, along with the variety of stalls of Swiss vendors and games. With all the rain that drenched the area in the week prior to the event, the ground was treacherous, slippery and muddy to say the least. So a last-minute decision was made to move the event indoors to the Federation and Education pavilions, along with erecting a covered walkway between the two buildings so patrons would be protected from the rainy weather.

The main seating we'd normally have outdoors, was moved to the Federal pavilion where we had the music entertainment by a Swiss Folk Trio, the Swiss Yodlers, our Alphorn players, and the Swiss Dance Group Alpegruess. The Education pavilion had the BBQ area, many Swiss vendors (from Swiss Community Care Society, Swiss Alliance Australia, Swiss Chamber of Commerce, Swiss Club of NSW, to Cercle Romand, and many others), the Tombola, as well as the fun family game stalls. Despite the miserable weather, we had approximately 450 people who came to enjoy the Swiss National Day festivities in a much more cozy way than in previous years.

I wish to give a heartfelt THANK YOU to the members of the Swiss Yodlers of Sydney, the **Swiss Dance Group** Alpegruess and all the volunteers who helped to make this year's event successful. I also wish to thank all our sponsors for their generous donations for our event this year. And last but not least, to all of you who came to brave the chilly and wet weather to celebrate Swiss National Day with us!



I unfortunately was not able to join, as I had to rush to Canada on the 28th July due to my ailing father, who sadly passed away peacefully in hospital two days later on 31st July. Born in Iberg, Switzerland, in 1936 (a village 7 km southeast of Winterthur, ZH), my dad would have been very proud to be at our Swiss Day Celebration, as he truly loved traditional Swiss folk music, and was part of the Iberg Männerchor for many years, until he made the big move to Canada in 1967 to start a new life with my mom (originally from Appenzell, AI). Council of the Swiss Abroad



On 22–23 August 2025, the newly elected Council of the Swiss Abroad (CSA) gathered at the Federal Palace in Bern for its constituent meeting, held as part of the Swiss Community Days. Over 100 delegates from around the world, together with members of parliament and representatives of the Department of Foreign Affairs, participated in workshops, exchanges, and the official council sessions.

The weekend was special in many ways: It marked the start of the new 2025-2029 legislative period of the CSA, introduced a new conference format partly replacing the former Congress, and, for the first time, nearly half of the Council members abroad were elected directly by Swiss citizens registered in their countries rather than through clubs.

Day 1 at the Federal Palace was dedicated to workshops and presentations designed to foster connections, gather feedback, and provide delegates with information and tools to carry out their role effectively.

On Day 2 the formal meeting of the Council took place in the beautiful National Council Chamber of the Federal Palace. Proceedings opened with an address by Maya Riniker, president of the National Council (House of representatives) and an interesting panel discussion with the Swiss Ambassadors to Singapore, Israel and New Zealand. The meeting was streamed live, and a recording is available here.

Key topics discussed over the two days included e-voting, access to health insurance and banks, and Bilaterale III. A resolution supporting a Yes vote in the e-ID referendum on 28 September was adopted by the Council, highlighting the importance of secure digital services for Swiss citizens abroad.

Representing Australia were Beat Knoblauch, Thomas Hofer, and Carmen Trochsler, with Roland Isler and Barbara Zingg following the live stream online. A special thank-you to outgoing delegate Katja Wallimann Gates, who also attended both days.

For the Australian delegation, highlights included connecting with delegates from across the

globe, convening in the impressive National Council Chamber, Thomas Hofer attending his first Council meeting, Beat Knoblauch chairing the Board and President elections in his role as the Council's oldest member, and Carmen Trochsler being re-elected to the Board of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad. Roland Isler was re-elected to the Compliance Committee.



SWISSCHAM AUSTRALIA HITS 40!

The highly anticipated Gala Dinner to celebrate the 40 th anniversary of SwissCham Australia was held on 1 st July 2025 at the Intercontinental Hotel in Double Bay. A record number of some 240 elegant guests gathered in the ballroom decorated with posters of the numerous sponsor companies, a real Who-is-Who of Swiss-Australian business. With the Swiss and Australian flags, and stunning red and white flower arrangements, a vibrant ambiance was created right from the start. Over pre-dinner drinks, many new contacts were made, as well as old established ones renewed. It was also a special occasion to meet a Swiss delegation visiting Australia and New Zealand. The delegation members represented Swiss government departments responsible for foreign trade and investment, the Swiss private sector and Swiss science, research and innovation.

The Hon. Margaret Beazley AC KC (Governor of NSW) and Matt Thistlewaite MP (Assistant Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade) were joined at the round table by Ambassador of Switzerland to Australia Nikolas Stürchler with some of his team, Consul General of Switzerland Elisabeth Bösch-Malinen, Swiss State Secretary for Education, Research and Innovation Martina Hirayama, and Simone Wyss Fedele, CEO of Switzerland Global Enterprise (S-GE), the official Swiss organisation for export and investment promotion.

A vivacious MC in a red jacket and white shirt (of course) led through the proceedings of the night, a 3-course dinner mixed with motivating speeches, interesting reflections on the past, present and future of SwissCham and Switzerland in general, and some personal anecdotes. Appearing on the huge screens, the personal video from Federal Councillor Guy Parmelin, Vice-President of the Swiss Confederation and Head of the Federal Department of Economic Affairs, Education and Research, was shown. On that particular day, he was on his way to Argentina, to sign international EFTA/ Mercosur trade agreements.

It was a historic moment when all attending former and current Board members and Chairs posed for a group photograph, with founding member and first President Peter Meury shaking hands with the ninth and current Chair, Allison Rossiter, CEO of Genetic Signatures. Also seen together were all four General Managers so far, with Martin Scarpino, a former Board member, appointed CEO in 2017.

A breath of Swiss mountain air caused the majority of the guests to point their mobile phones even higher – with loud bell ringing and energetic swinging of Swiss flags, the Swiss Yodellers and Alphorns NSW made their entrance to perform some famous Swiss yodelling, hands in pocket as is the tradition. Looking closely, you discovered that SwissCham

An anniversary is also a time to look back to the beginnings and to point out just a few highlights. The Swiss-Australian Chamber of Commerce & Deamp; Industry (then called SACCI) was incorporated in 1985, initiated by local businesspeople representing various Swiss enterprises, with the aim to create a platform and network for trade and investment between Switzerland and Australia. In May 1990 (when mobile phones were large as a brick, fax was used more than AI and Bob Hawke was PM), a full-time secretariat opened in Sydney with an employed General Manager. An enthusiastic dedicated group of Directors provided professional and financial support on an honorary basis. Chapters existed in Brisbane and Melbourne. In 2013, SACCI was rebranded as SwissCham Australia, to conform with the global guidelines of the Union of Swiss Chambers of Commerce Abroad.

The Chamber had to overcome many challenges till it grew and became known as an important base for large, medium and small enterprises involved in Swiss-Australian business. For many years, daily trade enquiries from the public were also passed on to the Chamber by the Swiss Consulate and Embassy.

Let's look at just a few activities over the years, usually involving member companies: seminars, workshops and At-Home introductions; specialised presentations affecting the ever-evolving business environment; participation at

the prominent Swiss Pavilions at selected trade exhibitions in Sydney and Melbourne; introductions to government representatives and agencies; renowned guest speakers from either country; joint events with the European Chambers; annual Golf Days; tours in gumboots and hard hats through the Sydney Harbour tunnel under construction, to check out the waterproofing by Swiss specialist SIKA; Swiss Banking Forums in 1995 with the CEO's of the then major three Swiss banks in Sydney and Melbourne, together with the respective State Treasurers. Black tie Swiss National Day Balls; cooking classes for one of the most famous Swiss dish, Gschnetzeltes with Rösti (diced veal in cream sauce with potato rösti) using sweet potatoes and kangaroo meat. During the unforgettable Sydney2000 Olympics/Paralympics, seminars on Location Switzerland, a Presence Suisse information desk in the Olympic House of Switzerland as well as the official receptions for the Swiss Olympic/Paralympic teams; regular webinars during COVID.

Some of these mentioned events are no longer taking place or have been given a new innovative direction. An annual highlight now is the Swiss Business Award Ceremony. Exclusive Ladies' Boardroom Lunches have been introduced. Today, an office in the city is really no longer necessary. A first contact is made via www.swisscham.com.au.

A radiant Chair Allison Rossiter closed the evening with a round of big applause and warm thanks. The guests slowly left, with a practical Curaprox travel toothbrush kit, Lindor chocolates and an informative booklet with special messages, photographs taken over the years and interesting facts and statistics. The booklet also listed the names and logos of all the loyal and generous sponsors and supporters, without whom the Anniversary Gala would not have been possible - a great souvenir to keep from a wonderful glittering night, where every single guest felt special to have attended this celebration of a very long-standing and respected connection and friendship between Australia and Switzerland. – heldanne@yahoo.com

History, Heritage and Timeless Treasure



There has been more development with regard to the ten unique Silver Gelatine photographs of the Swiss Society of NSW, forerunner of the Swiss Club of NSW, which feature in the three publications of the Swiss Community News (2019 issues 236, 237 and 238) and which were exhibited at a function for the Swiss Seniors at the Jubilee Room of Parliament House on 8 March 2019.

The beautiful and very special banner of the Swiss Society of New South Wales which marks the "elevenmen photograph", is double-sided, with the Swiss cross on its red background surrounded by the words Swiss Society of New South Wales, while on the back, beautifully embroidered, is the image of the mythical Helvetia, symbol of Switzerland, a Swiss shield in her right and a lyre in her left hand, also on a red background, all in silk, framed with silk cords and fringes.

We have been trying to identify the eleven men in that photograph to find out more about the Swiss Society and the people who made it work. Dr Bettina Boss had mentioned in issue 247 (November 2022) of the SCN that three of the eleven men had been identified. They are Messrs J.M. Kohler and S. Fusedale (back row fourth and fifth from left) identified by Rev. John Kohler and J.U. Vonwiller (front row last on the right) according to his great granddaughter Nicole Vonwiller.

The book The Swiss in New South Wales – a History depicts on page 38 the members of the Swiss Club of 1932, all individually named. Although the people are a bit older by then, five of them can be identified on

the eleven-men photograph and who, according to minutes of meetings of the Swiss Society, were office bearers in its committees. They are Messrs J.J. Roth standing, outer left. Next to him is Hans Schiess, proudly holding up the banner. Sitting on the outer left is Alfred Wunderlich, next to him Eugen Bloch and then Charles Brunner, President of the Swiss Society in 1918. They rotated the committee appointments every year, to share the work and responsibilities.

From photographs of the Wunderlich Brothers (Ernest, Dr Otto and Alfred), well known industrialists, we also recognise Ernest under the banner between Schiess and Kohler. Ernest

loved music and trained the choir's singing for the Swiss National Day celebration of 1918. Therefore, nine of the eleven men could thus far be named, while two remained a puzzle.

As can be seen from the complete series of photographs published in 2019 in the Swiss Community News, there is a 'mystery man' who appears in all ten of them. On the eleven-men photograph he is sitting, fourth from left, between Brunner and Vonwiller. We had a hunch, but no means to find documented evidence of who he was until some weeks ago when this all changed. I came across a report from my late husband Armin Roth of a phone call he had received in 2001, which reads as follows:

"It is coincidence that in March this year, a Mrs Isabel Meier, resident at Parramatta Park, rang me on the basis of their contacts with the Reverend John Kohler of St. Paul's Anglican Church at Burwood, whose father and grandfather had been friends of the Meier's and the Reverend confirmed that the son of Mrs Meier, Michael, resident on the Central Coast, 'was a contemporary of his since their joint times at the same school'. This Mrs Meier is the wife of a son of a Mr John Evangelist Meier who died on or about 1918. His date of birth was back in 1858, who arrived in Australia in 1888 and took over a restaurant by the name of Trocadero, where the Swiss Society met.

This Mr John Evangelist Meier also became one of the committee men of the Society. So, Mrs Meier's husband was a contemporary of Reverend Kohler's father, Mr Norman Kohler, who had been one of the outstanding Presidents of the Swiss Club and associated with it from the late 1940s to the early 1960s.

Mrs Meier is to move into a retirement village and is 'cleaning out her house'. Once her son Michael has approved things, she will call me to collect some boxes which contain materials from her husband's time and she believes also from his father. This would be probably the 'last living connection' to the early days, and it will be interesting material, supposedly some photographs are amongst the goodies in the boxes."

Our parcel of photographs in hand which has been advertised as 'Swiss Society of NSW' is obviously a family album that was treasured by Isabel Meier who expressed her concern to Armin that it could be of interest to the Swiss Club. Mentioning that they were possibly photographs of her late husband and his father, owner of the Trocadero Café/Restaurant in Castlereagh Street, there is no doubt now that the so-called 'mystery man' is none other than John Evangelist Meier who, according to a report by the Swiss Society, "was always welcoming compatriots and offered them a place to gather for meetings and events". The Society's annual report, dated 1st of December 1918, reads:

"Our first August fete has been a great success both financially and socially. It is with great regret that we have to record the loss of two members of the society viz. Mr. J Meier late of the Trocadero, and Mr Robert Maurer, and we wish to express our deep sympathy to both families. In regard to the death of Mr Meier especially, we have lost one of our best Swiss who has done more for our compatriots than anyone else. He was, in all the years he has been in this State, a most active member and had the satisfaction to see a Society grow up from a very small membership to its present-day members."

John E Meier had arrived in Sydney in 1888 at the age of 30. When he was 50, he married Alicia Shepherd. After the wedding, according to the newspaper, they went on a trip around the world. We can see the couple as the last passengers on the back of a sightseeing coach in New York.

Another photograph depicts most probably a visit to relatives but the picture that tugs at my heartstrings is Mr J.E. Meier carrying his young son John Pickwick on his shoulders. Sadly the boy was only nine years old when his father died of a serious illness in November 1918. One must assume that the eleven-



man photograph might have been one of the last photographs the Meier family had of him.

This locks this main photograph into that space of time. We can see these old friends dressed in celebratory vein, proudly wearing their new Swiss badges on their label adorned with a handcrafted white daisy, commemorating Swiss national day. It is a homogeneous group of visionary men, motivated, showing comradeship and perseverance aiming for an ultimate club that would in the prevailing social culture of the time give the Swiss Society official status on accepted rules.

It is an honoured tradition that Swiss national days are celebrated in the presence of an official consular representative. Mark Rutty, a longtime Consul of Switzerland in NSW, had left his post in August 1917. This prompted the Swiss government to install an administrator at interim, Mr Olav E Pauss, to take care of consular affairs until the proposed Eugen Bloch was

officially appointed Consul of Switzerland in 1920. I assume that the man standing on the outer right of the photograph gazing into the distance and holding the side of the banner is Mr Olav E Pauss.

Isabel Meier passed away at age 94 in 2010. It was also in 2010 that collector Josef Lebovic, established in Kensington, bought a packet of photographs from a dealer. In his collection catalogue in 2018 Lebovic offered them for sale. The advertisement carried the title 'Swiss Society of New South Wales'.



It was Mr Beat Knoblauch, our representative to the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad, businessman and discerning collector of art, who notice the advertisement in the Lebovic catalogue and passed it around at the 2018 Swiss Presidents' Meeting, however, reaping no interest. He told Bettina Boss who then rang me. I understand that the Swiss groups are non-profit institutions which have no budget for such acquisitions, but I remembered vividly that Armin had often wondered despondently, "Where are these photographs? They must be somewhere!" I had a feeling that maybe this is what he was looking for and acquired the photographs in his memory and to

make sure that the opportunity was not wasted for the Swiss community to own and cherish this unique historical treasure. When asking Mr Lebovic why he had bought the photographs, he said that his special interest is the documentation of exceptional cultural contributions to Australia made by immigrants.

It is intended that the series of these silver gelatin photographs will be exhibited at the forthcoming centenary celebration at Parliament House on Thursday 5th of February 2026 for all present to enjoy. In a later contribution we might try to get to know some of these extraordinary men on the inspiring eleven-men photograph a bit better.

If any readers or those viewing the photographs have something to share on the subject of ancestry pertaining to these photographs, or with regard to the Swiss Society or early years of the Swiss Club of NSW, we would much appreciate their communication.

Thirteen (13) items comprising of nine vintage silver gelatin photographs, two printout paper photographs and one platinum palladium photograph, plus one lithograph, five photographs with studio lines "Hall & Co., Sydney"; "Norman Photo, 19 Market St, Sydney"; or "The Swiss Studios, Sydney", 10.8 x 14.8cm to 34.5 x 26.6cm. Silvering, surface loss, foxing, tears and cracks, all laid down on original backing. One photograph in original frame.

Most photographs are group shiots depicting members holding the Swiss Society of NSW flag designed in 1895. The lithograph concerns the legend of the oath taken by three regional representatives in 1291 to establish a confederacy, eventually becoming Switzerland. The text reads "Le Grutti.' Lugardon pinxit. Erregevize lith d'apres Leon Noel. [The three oath-takers] Werner Stauffacher, Walter Fürst, Arnold an der Halden von Melchtal."

'The origins of the Swiss Club of NSW [SCNSW] began in the feverish migration of workers to Australia during the Gold Rush era of the 1850s...On 2 Sept. 1898 in Pfahlert's Hotel Sydney, seven Swiss men formed a 'benefit society for the Swiss residents of NSW. The main objectives of the Society were 'to give advice and information to those of Swiss nationality newly arrived in the cotony' and to assist 'any Swiss in NSW in want of help and worthy to receive assistance.'...In 1924, the Swiss Society of NSW was changed into the Swiss Club of NSW." Ref: SCNSW.

"Seeing Sydney - Knowing Country" an exhibition with a Swiss connection



The Swiss Community Care Society in Sydney invited its members to a guided tour at the Museums of History (Sydney Museum) in Bridge Street Sydney CBD on the 4th September 2025.

The occasion arose from the Swiss contribution to the current exhibition "Seeing Sydney - Knowing Country", curated by a team under the direction of Dr Penelope Stannard, Principle, Head of Curatorial and Research.

Some 40 members, including the visiting former CEO of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad in Berne, Rudolf Wyder, assembled in the Museum's foyer for

"Kaffee und Kuchen", then were led expertedly by Dr Stannard through the exhibition rooms.

The main theme of the exhibition was to highlight the Australian countryside the first settlers encountered in the Sydney area. Some 49 views of early Sydney gave a historical retrospective of the urban development of the Colony and were from the Beat Knoblauch Collection.

Furthermore, the Archives (Records) of NSW displayed rarely seen early documents, such as surveys, letters, land grants, which the viewer can see in specially built and illuminated display drawers. At the other end of

the main display room, the local fauna, as encountered in the early colonial times, is displayed as illustrations in prints, books and as real specimens.

Throughout the exhibition period furniture figures prominently, and a First Nation's graphic contemporary design is enmeshed in the overall concept.

With enthusiastic applause for the lecturer Dr Penelope Stannard, the tour ended on a high note.


